

Program Description

The focus of the 2019 David Stroud AYA Oncology Symposium will be on Sarcoma. Sarcoma can occur in any part of the body such as the bone or soft tissues which support and connect the body. There are at least 50 different types of soft tissue sarcoma which develop in the muscles, fat cells, blood vessels, tendons, nerves, the linking of joints or lymph vessels. This type of cancer represents approximately 25% of all adolescent and young adult cancers. Osteosarcoma and Ewing's Sarcoma are two of the most common bone sarcomas diagnosed in younger patients; osteosarcoma is the most common bone cancer.

The Symposium will offer new and practical information covering the spectrum of important issues in AYA sarcoma, including our current understanding of tumor biology; multi-modal therapy including surgery, radiation and chemotherapy; and survivorship and supportive care to improve quality of life. The Symposium will include a simulated "Tumor Board" discussion of an actual patient that will demonstrate the importance of coordinated, team-based care. Finally, presentations by AYA sarcoma survivors will offer practical information and inspiration to all. Presenters will include experienced physicians and other clinical providers, academic researchers, and patient advocates. Audience participation is encouraged through interactive Q&A periods throughout the day.

Educational Objectives

- Explain the biology of sarcomas in the AYA population and utilize the expertise of leaders in the field to develop feasible strategies for combatting the issue.
- Recognize the current approach of sarcoma treatment with AYAs specifically addressing the treatment discrepancy.
- Discuss key medical and psychosocial challenges that may affect the health of AYA sarcoma patients and long-term survivors.
- Identify gaps in education or treatment that persist, and discuss areas that may be the subject of future research in order to address these issues.

Target Audience

The target audience is all health care professionals (physicians, nurses, social workers, therapists and others) interested in improving the quality of care and outcomes for AYA cancer patients. Patients, survivors, caregivers and advocates are welcome.
